Outdoor Recreation in USA

 Participants - 104 million
 Expenditures - \$157 billion (US) spent
 Hunting - \$26 billion
 Fishing - \$46 billion
 Wildlife watching - \$76 billion







Outdoor Recreation in AR-LA-MS

Fishing

- 1.9 million anglers
- \$1.7 billion spent
- Hunting
 - 1.0 million hunters
 - \$1.8 billion spent
- Wildlife Watching
 - 2.2 million participants
 - \$1.1 billion







Outdoor Recreation in Mississippi

- Hunting

 - \$2.7 billion
 - 71,435 jobs created

What is a Recreational Hunting Lease?

An arrangement whereby the landowner grants access to his/her land for recreational hunting for a designated time period in exchange for fees or services.







Making Your Lease More Attractive

- Maintain a well-defined access trail system
- Provide hunting or observation blinds
- Implement wildlife food plots
- Provide designated camping sites
- Lodging
 - fire pit
 - firewood
 - outhouse
 - clothes-line
 - trash can or disposal
 - pitcher pump








Lease Agreement Provisions

- Lessees names
- □ Game species hunted or viewed
- □ Legal location of property
- Dated terms of lease
- Payment terms
- □ General conditions (Rules) of lease
 - Sub-leasing
 - Adhering to state wildlife game laws
 - Damage to live trees
 - Blind types allowed
 - Garbage removal
 - Trespass and fire prevention
 - Accepting land "As Is"
 - Designated camping sites
 - Maximum number of hunters or users
 - Motorized vehicle use
 - Hunting methods allowed
 - Bag limits







Legal Issues

Reduce liability on property

- "reasonable and prudent"
- Well written leases
 - Attorney review
 - Waivers
 - Rules enforcement
- Insurance
- Business structure







Leasing - How Much Can I Charge?

Price ranges

- Range: \$5 \$150/acre/year observed in Mississippi
- Better properties with good wildlife habitats will average \$21/acre.
- 16th Section Lands in MS averaged \$7-\$12/acre
- Pricing your lease
 - Land taxes
 - Other leases in area
- Separating leases







Rural Land Values Study

- Wildlife recreation represented one-third of land value
- Land types that were important
 - Forested
 - Agricultural
- Lenders estimated \$634/acre (34%) of land value







Rural Land Values Study

- Bottomland hardwood and mixed forests were predictors of recreation land sales
- Recreation uses hunting (99%) and motorized travel (65%)
- Game species deer, turkey, squirrel, rabbit, waterfowl, dove, and quail
- Leased tracts 123 tracts
 - Mean: 180 acres (range 12 2,292 acres)
 - Mean price of \$21/acre (range \$4.85-\$65.18)





Rural Land Values Study

- Roads to properties (86%) and on properties (32%)
- 330 tracts were reported to have lodging and/or utilities
 - \$1,027/acre higher for properties with lodging
- Lenders estimated \$634/acre (34%) of land value was due to wildlife recreation







Revenue Generation - Practices

Conservation increased revenues

- Hardwood and pine forests
- Wetlands and riparian areas
- Strip disking and mowing
- Timber thinning and harvests
- Prescribed fire
- Field borders and plantings
- Landowner cooperatives











Successful NRE Attributes
